Lesson—The Heart Wants What the Heart Wants¹ Text: Jeremiah 31:29-

34; John 1:7

I. Aim for Change/Learning Objectives

By the end of this lesson, we will...

- 1. Interpret the promise and the implications of the renewed covenant.
- 2. Cherish the transformation that comes from having a heart relationship with God.
- 3. Adopt and practice a rule for life that comes from the heart.

Why This Lesson Matters: God told Jeremiah that the people would be without excuse because, "I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts" (Jeremiah 31:33b, NRSVUE)—therefore, God would forgive their iniquity and remember their sin no more.

Key Verse: After those days, sayeth the Lord, I will put my law in their inward parts, and write it in their hearts; And will be their God, and they shall be my people. (Jeremiah 31:33b, KJV)

III. Historical/Biblical Background and Lesson Context

In this historical context, Jeremiah 31 appears as a bright light of hope within a series of judgment prophecies. The prophet introduced the concept of individual responsibility versus collective guilt, challenging the prevalent idea of generational punishment. This new understanding prepared the way for the new covenant's emphasis on personal relationship with God. The passage from John's gospel, written centuries later, reflects on how Jesus fulfilled this promised covenant.

The 1st-century Jewish audience would have immediately recognized these connections between Jeremiah's prophecy and Christ's ministry. This context helps explain why early Christians saw Jesus not as abolishing the law but as fulfilling it in a way that accomplished what the old covenant could not.
